PREFACE

This section of Postal Auction No. 56 offers an excellent range of military medals and Militaria from numerous collections and includes more than 400 lots from “*A Miscellaneous African Collection*”. There is a comprehensive selection of Boer War medals including some well known gems from the Loots collection.

Following on the huge interest shown in ZAR medallions offered in the previous two auctions we are able once again, to offer a further group of these very popular Boer War commemoratives from the collection assembled by the Late Willem Joubert.

Our special thanks go to Ian Uys for his illuminating article on the Battle of Delville Wood. Medals to Delville Wood participants are very popular with collectors and we are appreciative to the collectors who consigned some of their treasures from their collections to support the theme to commemorate the 90th Anniversary of this South African epic. The two groups which relate to Longueval Village and Captain Tomlinson’s Raid will surely evoke considerable interest. This year, 2006, also marks the Centenary of the Bambata (Natal) Rebellion of 1906 and it is fitting that the sale includes a Natal 1906 medal to one of the few European casualties (lot no 516). For South Africans in particular it is perhaps also fitting to remember the sacrifice of so many Zulu combatants during this short and perhaps unnecessary conflict.

It is with great respect and sadness that we record the death of Colonel Ivor Moore of Robertson. City Coins disposed of his collection in Sale 55 and we are now privileged to offer not only his own personal medals for sale (Lot 597) but also the Royal Army Medical Corps DCM group awarded to his father (Lot 375). Other properties of particular note include the OBE group of eight awarded to the son of Major General Sir J.G. Dartnell (Lot 370), the MBE pair to Donald McIntyre, the well known Postmaster of George (Lot 372). Lot 703 includes a good MC group to Lieutenant Gray of the 28 Punjabis Regiment with the WWI Military medal trio awarded to Pte. Theodore Hook (Lot 378) of the 2nd S.A.I. This includes a poignant photograph to a casualty on the first day of the Battle of Arras.

Amongst the campaign medals on offer there is a rare BSA Company Mashonaland 1890 and QSA pair (Lot 535) while the group of three listed under Lot 545 includes the extremely rare and elusive 3 bar Cape of Good Hope General Service medal. The two Korean groups listed under Lots 592 and 596 are of particular interest while the group of the Campbell family medals under Lots 598 and 599 clearly illustrate the tragedy of the splitting of medal groups by family members. By contrast it is the collector who researches and treasures the medals in his collection and who really perpetuates the memory of the old soldier.

Collectors of awards to women will surely be impressed by the significant archive of South African National and Nursing awards presented to Professor Searle, Doyen of South African Nursing (listed under Lot 628).

The 400 plus lots under listed under a “*Miscellaneous African Collection*” offer collectors ample opportunity to acquire many affordable new medals for their collections. Never-the-less the collection includes a good cross section of QSA medals including a fine Defence of Mafeking Pair (Lot 750) and the large offering of WWI medals. Collector interest in the medals of the Great War is rapidly increasing and it is my intention to update my Late

father's booklet on Medals of the Great War and to republish this on the City Coins Website shortly.

DELVILLE WOOD

Each year Delville Wood day has been remembered – not because this First World War battle played a significant part in the war, but because it represents the bravery, fortitude and self-sacrifice of South African soldiers. It was described by an eminent British military historian, Sir Basil Liddel Hart, as the bloodiest battle-hell of 1916.

This was in a year when over a million men were killed in action.

The battle took place in the Somme area of France, in a wood adjoining the village of Longueval - the *Bois de la Ville* or *Wood of the village*. The British attack on a 20 kilometre front had incurred massive casualties, 60,000 on the first day, of whom 20,000 were killed. The South African brigade was in reserve and from 14 July when they were first committed they knew there would be no relief. They had to hold the wood at all costs.

Brigadier Henry Timson 'Tim' Lukin **CMG DSO**, 55, had fought in the Zulu War of 1879 and had chosen mainly youngsters to fight. The battalions consisted of the **1st** from the Cape, the **2nd** from Natal and the OFS, the **3rd** from Transvaal and Rhodesia and the **4th** was from various South African Scottish units.

English and Afrikaans speakers fought together. No Blacks were allowed but a number of Coloureds took part. There were even Americans. Second-Lieutenant Walter Kirby served in the SA Scottish. 'Yank' Veitch from Boston saved many lives when he ripped a burning tarpaulin off an ammunition wagon. He was killed in the later fighting.

The Navy and Air Force were also represented. Hugh Boustead had deserted from the Royal Navy to fight with the South African Scottish. A South African, Major Allister Miller, 23, flew a biplane above the wood, spotting enemy positions for the artillery. He survived to be awarded the **DSO**.

During the next five days the South Africans held the wood despite over 100,000 shells levelling all the trees. A runner, Harry Cooper, took a message to General Lukin and recalled that Lukin had tears in his eyes as he asked how it went with his boys. The wood resembled a volcano.

Religion played its role. Rev George Cook had been killed a few days earlier and Rev Eustace Hill of St John's College carried on. Throughout the fighting he ministered to the wounded and dying. When calling for stretcher bearers he shouted:

"Do you believe in God? If you do, follow me!" Many did, but one muttered,

"It's all very well for you father, if hit you know where you'd go!"

There are numerous stories of individuals in the fight.

Among my most memorable are: Sec-Lieut Walter Hill from Pietermaritzburg and his platoon were cut off on the 16th. They fought until they ran out of ammunition, then had to surrender. After being led from the wood Hill saw an opportunity, assaulted his guard and fought his way back into the wood. He was killed two days later.

On the morning of the 17th July Gen Lukin came into the wood to confer with senior officers. Victor Casson, 18, rushed up to him, saluted, and said:

"I'm the only survivor of Kimberley Company, Sir."

Lukin nodded then replied: *"Well done. Now go back to your position until relieved."* Casson threw Mills bombs until captured the next day, but still shook his head unbelievably when recounting this 66 years later.

During the massive bombardment on the 18th Pte Garnet Tanner was a runner, dodging shell blasts to deliver a message. A shell landed below him and blew him up. He turned a somersault, then came down head first in the shell hole, which collapsed on him. He waved his legs until some comrades pulled him out. Tanner then continued delivering messages, thereby earning the **DCM**.

Frank Marillier from Queenstown recalled the devastation caused by German snipers, who were hard to spot and eradicate. When the Germans approached from the rear on the 18th Captain Wallace Hoptroff ran over to Marillier's group and told them to retire quickly. Hoptroff was then shot. As he fell Marillier noticed his gold watch and was always sorry that he hadn't taken it for the gallant captain's family. Marillier became one of the 140 men who left the wood with Col Frank Thackeray and Lieuts Garnet Green and Edward Phillips.

One of the men taken prisoner told me that as an 18-year-old he was made a milkman in a distant German province. With all the German men away at war he spent the next two years looking after their wives. He still had a smile on his face 70 years later.

I was honoured to meet many of the Delville Wood veterans and was amazed at the camaraderie they showed when together. They joked that whenever I had interviewed one of them the man then died. I denied this, but it seemed to be true! Maurice Cristel died in 1983, aged 91, while playing a game of squash.

When I mentioned it to Eddie Fitz, he replied: "***Maurice didn't die. He committed suicide!***"

Joe Samuels visited Cape Town with his American granddaughter when he was 100 years old. He was delighted when I confirmed his story that on the 16th they had mistaken Germans on the eastern side of the wood for French soldiers. For many of the veterans the events they recalled were as though they had happened yesterday.

Eventually on the 20th three wounded officers and 140 men had been relieved - out of 121 officers and 3,052 men who had taken the wood. Two days later five officers and 700 men paraded before Gen. Lukin, who stood with bared head and tears in his eyes.

The men and boys of the 1st SAI Brigade were ordinary South Africans who had done an extraordinary thing – and proved to the world that their soldiers were second to none.

The casualty returns sent a shock through the country as many families were affected. May such sacrifices never again be demanded of our people.

For South African medal collectors having a medal to a Delville Wood man is a gem in any collection.

DELVILLE WOOD

Ian Uys is undoubtedly correct when he states in the concluding paragraph of his article printed in the Introduction to this catalogue

“For the South African medal collectors having a medal to a Delville Wood man is a gem in any collection”.

The following lots have been specially selected to commemorate the 90th Anniversary of this illustrious battle and represent the most extensive array of medals awarded to those who served during *this, the bloodiest battle hell of 1916*, ever offered for sale. The names of all the recipients described under lots 351 to 369 are listed in Ian Uys’s book **Rollcall: The Delville Wood Story**. (See also “de Méneaud Collection” lots 33 and 117 and lots 884 and 928)

- 351. Four** – QSA 2 bars: CC, SA’01 **EF 8.000 – 15.000**
1628 Tpr. I. **Bate** W. Prov. M.R.; BWM; AVM (Bil.)
Capt. C.I. Bate; Somme Veterans unofficial medal
(bronze – unnamed).

Recipient’s rank and initial on QSA officially corrected, date bar loose on ribbon.

An historically important Delville Wood officer’s group to a well documented recipient.

The Battle of the Somme began at 07h00 on Saturday morning, 1st July 1916. More than 20000 Allied troops were killed in action during the opening of the attack on the first day. Many more were wounded. The first South African experience of battle was to hold a piece of captured front in the face of heavy enemy shelling and therefore there were not many South African casualties. After five days in the trenches, the South Africans were relieved on the 7th July. The real test of the mettle of the South African troops began on the dawn of Friday the 14th July when an attack was launched against a section of the German second position – a front four miles wide from a point southeast of Pozieres to Longueval and Delville Wood.

The village of Longueval is situated on a ridge abutting the western side of the junction of four roads. Delville Wood is the adjacent area of 156 acres situated on the eastern side of Longueval between the road to Fiers in the north and Ginchy road to the southeast.

The attack on Longueval and Delville Wood was launched at 03h25 on Friday 14th July. After an initial attack by the 26th Brigade, the 1st S.A.I. fought through a heavy barrage in eight lines of sections. At 14h00 the 1st Battalion under Lieut. Col. Dawson attacked the remainder of Longueval Village and by 16h00 both “A” and “B” companies had reached their first objective, but were held up by machine-gun fire from front and flank.

Ian Uys records that at 23h00 that night urgent orders were received from the O.C. of the 27th Brigade that these machine-guns, which were holding up the advance, were to be taken. **Three parties under Lieut. Cron Bate a 34 year old Lieutenant in charge of No 9 Platoon in “C” Company and Lieutenants Burgess and Henry left at midnight to capture the enemy posts.** They returned to report that the northern part of the village was a nest of machine-guns.

Lieut. Bate would have been part of the force of “C” Company 1st S.A.I. who later occupied the southwest of Delville Wood on the 15th July. On Sunday 16th July “C” Company moved to reinforce the north eastern side of the Wood where they were later heavily shelled. On Tuesday 17th at 08h00 an intensive bombardment began, worse than anything before, which was to last for 7½ hours. “C” Company had many killed while some were taken Prisoner. **Cron Bate was reported missing in the field on 18th July.** A telegram sent on 12th August 1916 confirmed the report of his capture. Taken prisoner at Delville Wood, **Lieut. Bate spent the rest of the war as a PoW in Germany. He was interned in Holland in June 1918 and repatriated to England in November where he spent two months at the Richmond Hospital.** Although he was **appointed Captain** on the 8th June 1916 this promotion was only implemented in January 1919.

Cron Ivor Bate was born in 1881. He matriculated at the well known boy’s school, Bishops, in Cape Town. He was a keen rugby player and served in the Western Province Mounted Rifles for 3 months and for a further 6 weeks as a despatch rider in Harrismith He was commissioned as a Lieutenant on 17th September 1915 in the 1st Battalion S.A.I. After disembarking at Alexandria on the 12th January 1916 and saw brief service in North Africa during the Senussi

campaign. After his release and recovery in England he returned to Cape Town.
A banker by profession he eventually retired from the post of Manager of the Sea Point Branch of the Standard Bank.

Sold with *copies of his detailed service papers, death notice, a short newspaper obituary and a group of three mounted miniature medals as worn by the recipient.*

352. **Four – Military Medal (MM) (Geo. V) EF 8.000 – 15.000**

6845 Sjt. W.S. Mc Donald 3/S.AFR. INF.;

QSA 3 bars: Tvl, SA'01, SA'02; BWM;

AVM (Bil.) Sjt. W.S. Mc Donald 3rd S.A.I.

The QSA and BWM are unfortunately *skimmed replacements.*

The AVM a gift to the seller from Bill Hibbard of City Coins many years ago!

A poignant Gallantry award for a documented participant in one of the most well known actions undertaken during the battle of Delville Wood.

MM: London Gazette 9th December 1916.

The original commendation for this award reads as follows: "*In Delville Wood on 15 July 1916 he ably supported L/Cpl Shapcott, and was seriously wounded in the chest (raid by Capt. Tomlinson)*". It is of interest to quote the commendation for the award of a DSO to Capt. Tomlinson, which reads as follows:

"This Officer having occupied the Eastern and North Eastern Edge of Delville wood, on July 15th, with his Company, on his own initiative raided an uncharted German Trench, some 150 yards East of the Wood, which was strongly held - with Infantry, and Machine Guns, which were inflicting heavy casualties on our men while consolidating the edge of the Wood.

Capt. Tomlinson with a small fighting section, rushed the trench, killing 32 Germans, and capturing 2 Officers and 70 men, and a machine Gun, all of which were brought in under heavy fire from enemy-machine guns and rifles, which was opened on him and his party of prisoners. Capt. Tomlinson held his position in the Wood till wounded on the 15th July 1916".

Sergeant William Simpson Mc Donald, the son of Charles and Barbara Mc Donald of Newton Dee Cottage, Murtle, Aberdeen, was born in 1878. According to his Attestation Form and Military History Sheet he served in South Africa during the Boer War with the 1st Gordon Highlanders for a period of 1 year and 46 days in 1901 and 1902 and was discharged in South Africa. He attested with the 3rd S.A.I. in October 1915 and was appointed Sergeant while in the field on 19th June 1916.

Ian Uys, in his book **Rollcall** records "*Mc Donald's part in the well known action undertaken by Captains Medicott and Tomlinson ("B" and "D" Companies of 3rd S.A.I. respectively) in leading raiding parties in an attack on the German trench*" beyond their positions on the eastern and southeastern perimeter on Saturday 15th July.

Pte. Leffler of "D" company took part in the fighting and later recorded:

"Snipers were busy, and 16 Platoon lost a second sergeant and a few men. Then came Corporal Shapcott with a yarn that a trench in front of the Wood contained seven men and a machine gun - he'd counted them from a tree he had climbed. A party of officers and NCO's crept across and began bombing Fritz - but he had more than six pals. So 16 Platoon and some of "B" Company charged with the bayonet and brought back three officers, 135 other ranks and a machine-gun. What we killed heaven only knows. Captain Tomlinson got the DSO and Shapcott got the DCM. When we got back we found L/Cpl Biggs and poor old 16 Platoon's third sergeant missing. Sergeant Mac Donald, badly wounded, was seen trying to crawl back with bullets spurting dust all around him. Lieutenant Guard, CSM Bryant and someone else went out and carried him back under heavy fire. If anyone deserved the VC, each of them did."

Corporal Lilford (3rd Bn D Coy) later pointed out that 16 Platoon had actually gone to the rescue of the raiding party:

"A consultation was then held by the officers, and a storming of volunteers consisting of

Captain Tomlinson, Lieut. Somerset, Sgt. Mac Donald, Cpl. Briggs and Cpl. Shapcott-Jones, was formed to raid the trench. They succeeded in crossing No-man's-land and entering the trench, but found it heavily occupied, and in response to their shouts the platoon charged over and stormed the trench with the bayonet, taking 180 prisoners. Captain Tomlinson won the DSO and Cpl. Shapcott Jones the DCM. Briggs was killed and Sgt. MacDonald was left behind wounded. Soon afterwards, seeing him crawling in, Lieut Guard and Sgt-Maj Bryant went and carried him out in the face of very heavy fire. MacDonald died on his way to the dressing station and Bryant was killed next day."

The award of the Military Medal to Sergeant MacDonald is interesting. Unlike the Victoria Cross, Military Medals were not given as posthumous awards. Mac Donald's service papers refer to the official letter report subsequent to the Battle of Delville Wood dealing with the period 15th to 20th July which records that he was reported missing and that he was subsequently presumed dead due to "*Wounds or in Action*". The **S.A. Roll of Honour** for the 1914-18 War records: "*6845 a/Sgt. McDonald (M.M.) W.S., F. M/D/A 20.7.16.*"

Sold with full Boer War and WWI attestation forms, military service and casualty papers.

353. **Pair** – BWM; AVM (Bil.) **VF** **1.000 – 1.500**

L/Cpl W.N.F. **Humphrey** 3rd S.A.I.

Wesley Humphrey was **wounded** (gunshot wounds, left wrist and right knee) at **Delville Wood** on 19 July 1916. On 21 July he was hospitalized in London and finally discharged on 30 Sept 1916. He was **wounded** for a **second time** on 9 April 1917 (severe gunshot wound in right arm) at the **Battle of Arras**. This kept him in hospital for some 6 weeks up to 19 May 1917. He next caught a severe bout of influenza. This hospitalised him in Rouen from 15 June 1917 to 29 July 1917. On 20 Sept 1917, during the **Battle of Menin Road**, he was **wounded** for the **third time** (severe gunshot wounds to legs). These kept him in and out of hospital up to June 1918. He was finally discharged at Wynberg on Boxing Day 1918 with a **40% disability pension**.

354. **Three** – 1914-15 Star Pte J.T. **Murray** Enslin's Hse.; **VF+** **1.200 – 1.500**
BWM; AVM (Bil.) Pte. J.T. Murray 3rd S.A.I.

(cloth patch: 1 red and 3 blue chevrons)

Pte. John Murray served with Enslin's Horse in GSWA from Sept 1914 to Jan 1915. After 4 months with the SA Veteran Rgt (Feb-June 1915), he attested in the 3rd S.A.I. in Nov 1915.

Murray was **wounded** (GSWA in the spine) at **Delville Wood** on **16 July 1916** and spent 101 days in Richmond Hospital. Authorisation for wearing the Chevrons is noted on his Service Cards. Sold with *copies of Service Cards, Service File and Medical File.*

355. **Four** – BWM; AVM (Bil.) A/Sjt. A.J. **Musgrave** **VF** **1.200 – 2.500**

4th S.A.I.; WM; ASM 43412 A.J. Musgrave

Various attestation papers indicate that Arthur John Musgrave was born in 1885 and served with the Cape Mounted Rifles between 1903 and 1910. He did not serve in GSWA but attested for service with the S.A. Expeditionary Force in September 1915. He served in Egypt and France including the **Battle of Delville Wood** and was wounded on 4th May 1917. He was a Detective with the S.A.R. & H and served within the Union during WWII.

Sold with *detailed service papers.*

The ring suspender of the AVM has been refitted with a narrow straight bent wire suspender, however, the medal is not damaged in any way.

MEMORIAL PLAQUE

356. – Vernon Liddell **Adams** **VF+** **700 – 1.200**

Pte V.L. Adams, 3rd SAI, was **KiA** at **Delville Wood** on the 5th day of battle, **19 July 1916**.

357. – Jacobus Johannes **Laubser** **VF+** **900 – 1.200**

Pte. J.J. Laubser of the 1st S.A.I. was **KiA** on **18th July 1916** during the **Battle of Delville Wood**.

Jacobus Laubser's service papers indicate that he was 18 years old when he first attested in August 1915. Proceeded overseas during May 1916 and joined his unit in the field the 6th June.

George Bruce Dartnell, son of Maj Gen Sir J G Dartnell, was employed as a 3rd Class Clerk in the Natal Civil Service up to the end of *July 1900*. He then, possibly through the influence of his father, "*obtained an appointment in the Military Service of Her Majesty*" (see *copy of telegram dated "24 July 1900"*).

He was commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant in the ASC in *Aug 1900* and as Lieutenant in *Nov 1901*. His initial WWI service was in France and Flanders between *Aug 1914* and *Nov 1915*. During *1916/17* he was employed under the Ministry of Munitions, was **Mid** (*London Gazette 15 June 1916*) and awarded the **OBE** in the **London Gazette** of *3 June 1919*. He was also awarded the Serbian Order of the White Eagle, 4th Class.

Dartnell's final service was in Waziristan in the early 1920's.

Mr Donald Ardene McIntyre was born at Kwartelfontein in the District of Caledon in 1857. He was educated at the Diocesan College in Rondebosch, Cape Town and married Florence Maud Philipson Stow in 1886. Entering the civil service in 1875, he was later appointed Clerk-in-Charge of the Telegraph Department at George in October 1877. After gaining experience through postings at King William's Town, Burghersdorp and Kimberley, he was appointed Postmaster at George in 1886. After first being appointed Sergeant in "C" Company of the George Town Guard, he was later appointed Captain and Commanding Officer. It has been said that the George Town Guard was formed as a result of commando raids into the area by General Smuts. After serving 22 years as the Postmaster of George, he retired in 1908 and he was appointed as a Councillor for the Rondebosch Municipality in November 1912. Being too old for active service during WWI he made his contribution by getting involved with the transport and care of sick and wounded soldiers. He was awarded the MBE for his outstanding work in this capacity and for his role as Secretary of the Royal Automobile Club of South Africa which undertook sterling work in the provision of hospital transport throughout South Africa. He died at Paarl in 1942.

This lot is sold with several photographs of the George Town Guard. Some are of the full unit, and others of the officer group alone, a retirement notice, a newspaper obituary as well as an obituary published in his old school magazine, a 2 ½ page article entitled “**A Postmaster Looks Back**” on the history of the Post Office in George over 100 years, which includes several interesting aspects of Mr McIntyre’s early life and career in George, the roll of the George Town Guard as well as an extract from a book on the Order of the British Empire, published in 1921, a copy of the two pages of the London Gazette in which appear the names of South Africans admitted to the Civil Division of the Order of the British Empire for their work in connection with the Great War, from KBE to MBE.

All these details are neatly recorded on a CD. See his only son’s medals lot no 543.

The recommendation of the award of the DSO submitted by the Brigade’s G.O.C. reads as follows:

“A fine type of Commanding Officer whose display of personal courage and cool and quiet demeanour had a wonderful effect on his Command. An Officer whom I consider eminently suitable for special recognition.”

This group has not been actively researched. The recipient’s name is not included in the published **ABO/DTD** medal roll.

The citation for this gallantry award, as published in the London Gazette of 15 June 1917 reads as follows:

“For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded in both thighs and head, he continued to lead his company during the advance along the railway line under intense and well-directed fire from the enemy’s guns.”

James Wensley Gray, a 2/Lieutenant of the I.A.R.O was born in Dorrington in Ballymor in August 1873. He served with the 28 Punjab Regiment and the **wounds he received** during this action at Baghdad on 10th March 1917 are detailed in the proceedings of a Medical Board assembled at Deolali on 25th April 1917. He presumably immigrated later to South Africa and, now incorrectly giving his birth date as 1883, served as a 2/Lieut with the S.A. Military Police Corps (No 4 Provincial Company, Port Elizabeth) during WWII.

He was released from service in 1944. Ex Frank Mitchell collection. See Colour Plate VI

He subsequently took part in the attempts to stem the British advance at Klip River and Doornkop (28 & 29 May 1900) and was taken **PoW** at Doornkop on 30 May 1900. He spent the rest of the war in Ceylon.
 On 29 October 1914 he enrolled as Sergeant in the Rustenburg Commando for service in GSWA. He was mentioned, together with three others, "...for conspicuous gallantry during the operations round Otjimbingwe, Okahandja and Suis, especially at the latter place where they rendered valuable service which resulted in the surrender of two Officers and 63 enemy other ranks".
 The initial award recommended was an MM, but this was upgraded to a DCM and gazetted as such on 22 August 1918. In May 1916 he enlisted in the 6th SA Horse for service in East Africa, but was finally discharged as "*physically unfit for further war service*" in Feb 1917.

 Private Theodore Charles Hook was born in Barberton in 1889. He was a farmer at Inchanga outside Durban. His attestation papers, dated 19 August 1915, indicate that he did not serve in GSWA. He was amongst the 106 other ranks who were **wounded at Mersa Matruh** during the Senussi campaign in January 1916 when his regiment gained the battle honour "*Egypt 1916*". He recovered. However his service papers indicate that he was not present at Delville Wood but returned to duty in time to earn a Military Medal for Gallantry during the attack on the Warlencourt line on 12th October 1916. He was later **KiA** in the capture of Athies on the first day of the **Battle of Arras** on 9th April 1917.
 A copy of the original hand written recommendation for the award of his M.M., on the official form dated 18.10.1916 and signed by Colonel Christian O.C. of the 2nd S.A.I., is included. There were 301 awards of the M.M. to the South African Infantry for Egypt, France and Flanders, and those that come on the market are seldom found with full recommendation details. Hook's recommendation reads:
"In the attack on the Walencourt Line on the afternoon of the 12th October this man and another were the only two men hit of "A" Company's two Lewis gun Teams. Private Hook picked up the one undamaged Lewis Gun and continued to advance under very heavy fire. When the advance was brought to a standstill, he placed his gun in a shell hole, collected several drums of ammunitions and proceeded to dig himself in. By 8pm the gun was in a good emplacement and Private Hook had collected 40 drums of ammunition under a very heavy fire. During the night he, with the help of several men, he had collected and directed, improved the gun emplacement into a very excellent strong point. His conduct in previous actions has always been excellent."
 Theodore Hook lies buried at the Point-du-Jour Military Cemetery, Athies, Pas de Calais, France. His name is commemorated on the War Memorial outside the Durban City Hall as well as the Memorial Tower to St. Mary's Church at Greyville in Durban. Sold with a good

photograph of the recipient in uniform wearing the MM ribbon as well as photographs of his grave, headstone, etc., copy of soldier's service papers, and a copy of a seldom seen Union Government document, an Imperial Service Contingent notification of death, countersigned by the Minister of Defence.

On his SWA Service Cards a 3rd name "**van Slingerhout**" is noted and his rank is amended to "**Pte**" with a note "**Pay has no information of Promotion**". However, in *April 1915* he is noted as Lieutenant, SASC, T&R and he served in this capacity up to the end of *July 1915*.
 He served in East Africa as Lieut. & QM with the 3rd SA Horse for less than 5 months in *1915/16*, and after lengthy hospitalisation for malaria and neuritis and long periods on sick leave, he was finally released from service in *January 1918*. He received a disability pension till at least *31 March 1919*.
 His service in SWA was doubly rewarded in the **London Gazette** of *22 Aug 1918*.
 He received an **MiD**, with the original recommendation as:
"For general distinguished service and for bravery displayed at Otavifontein where he rendered assistance to a wounded officer at considerable personal risk"

There are a number of S.A. Archival references to the surname Gatonby (an 1820 Settler name) and this medal, which is new to the market, might provide a good story.

“**Kroo**” is defined in older dictionaries as: “*a member of a Negro tribe of the Guinea Coast in West Africa*”. These men were quite widely employed in the Royal Navy and, although they were usually assigned “**English**” names, some were known by unusual names such as “**Too Small**”, “**T. Coffee**” and “**Tom Sierra Leone**”.
This silver QSA is one of the relatively few issued to “**men of colour**”. An additional point of interest is that “**HMS Sybille**” was the only ship to be lost in the Boer War: she ran ashore and foundered near Lambert’s Bay on 16 January 1901. A few days prior to her unfortunate end she had actively engaged the enemy by opening fire on a Boer patrol which appeared on the dunes.

He then enlisted in the 1st Scottish Horse at East London on 8 Jan 1901, stating his trade as “*Farrier*”. However, on 15 March 1901, he was discharged at Pietermaritzburg : a note on the **Muster Roll** states “*Insubordination*”.

Ten days later he enlisted in the Bushveldt Carbineers (BVC) at Durban as 130 Trooper. According to Bill Woolmore, in his recent book on the BVC and PLH, Grey “*while serving with the BVC in the Spelonken area, had participated in the drinking of the detachment’s looted rum supply near Dwars River. He then absconded to Pietersburg where Colonel Hall demanded his resignation.*” He was discharged from the BVC on 16 October 1901.

On 23 October 1901 Hancock, Witton and other Officers and men of the BVC were arrested near Pietersburg and charged before a Court of Enquiry in connection with the murder of a number of Boers. The same fate befell “*Breaker*” Morant when he returned from leave.

Due to all the unsavoury publicity the BVC was re-designated the Pietersburg Light Horse (PLH), with the new name taking effect from 1 Dec 1901. Grey re-enlisted in the PLH on 7 Feb 1902 at Green Point as 544 Trooper and served to the end of hostilities.

Grey’s QSA claim was entered on the BVC/PLH roll, but the entry was ruled through and the medal and bars were inexplicably issued off the roll of the 1st Scottish Horse.

Robert Currie enlisted in the Cape Mounted Riflemen in Feb. 1896, giving his trade as "*Sailor*". He subsequently took part in the Bechuanaland Campaign (1897) and served for the full duration of the Boer War. In 1902 he attended the Coronation ceremonies in London as part of the Cape Contingent.

On 20 September 1907 Cpl Currie was one of the 105 men from the Cape Mounted Riflemen and Cape Mounted Police who helped the Imperial German Forces to track down and kill Joseph Morenga, the notorious Damara Chief in the Gordonia District of the Cape Colony.

As a token of gratitude the Governor of South West Africa used his authority to award the 1904-06 SWA Commemorative Medal to the entire Cape Contingent. After King Edward VII granted the men permission to accept and wear the "*foreign*" award, the Governor of the Cape Colony in January 1909 distributed 105 medals and 90 specially sanctioned bars "*Kalahari 1907*". The men who were actually present at the engagement received the medal with the bar and those who were only involved in tracking Morenga received the medal. A unique aspect of the episode is that this particular bar was not granted to any of the German troops in South West Africa and can thus never be found in a group of Imperial German medals.

The CMR was incorporated in the 1st Regt, SA Mounted Riflemen on 1 March 1913. As such, Currie took part in the South West African Campaign and was one of the 1st SAMR contingent captured by the Germans at the Battle of Sandfontein on 26 Sept 1914 (an ironic twist of fate after helping the Germans 8 years earlier!) He was released as **PoW** in July 1915. After further service in SWA and the Union, he retired on pension on 27 Sept 1920.

 Daniel Sheppard was born at Clumber near Grahamstown in 1880. He first attested with the Diamond Fields Horse in 1898 and after amalgamation served with the Kimberley Regiment. After the Boer War he was promoted Sergeant in 1907 and was discharged in December 1912. He was **wounded** during the action at **Carter's Ridge** during the Defence of Kimberley. At the age of 35 years he re-enlisted with the 7th Infantry Kimberley Regiment on the 30th September 1914 for service in GSWA. He re-attested with the 1st S.A.I. ("C" Comp.) in August 1915. He was present at the battle of Agagiya near Sidi Barrani during the Senussi campaign (Egypt) and landed in France on the 20th April 1916.
 Lt. Col. Heal, Officer commanding 1st S.A.I., originally recommended Sheppard for the award of the DCM. His recommendation, dated 27 February 1918, is set out on Army Form No W. 3121 and reads as follows:
"This W.O. by his behaviour in action and in the line has set a splendid example to the men under his command. Altho' well over military age his keenness has been most marked. He has taken part in every action with his unit since 1915. Has rendered excellent service to his officers by the good organization of his company."
 This original handwritten recommendation was later amended for the recommendation of an MSM. Sheppard's medical file has not been located and perhaps this is the reason why he is surprisingly not listed by Ian Uys as a participant at Delville Wood. He was appointed Company Sergeant Major on 20 September 1917 and was discharged in February 1918 before the end of the war. The award of a King's Silver Badge (not included in lot) presumably indicates that he was wounded in late 1917. The lot also includes forms "D" and "E" setting out his service details and qualifying application for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service medal, gazetted on 23 May 1925. There were only 708 awards of this medal gazetted to the Union of South Africa from 1910 to the last awarded in 1949. Also included is a named photograph of the recipient in uniform (1923), a newspaper funeral notice and a photograph of his gravestone (died 1958). 303 MSM's were awarded to South African Forces during WWI. Of these only 75 were awarded for Egypt, France and Flanders, of which less than half were to the infantry. In most instances the detailed recommendation has not survived. Sheppard served as Regimental Sergeant Major of the Kimberley Regiment in 1924 and 1925. His name was not found on the KSA rolls for the Natal Police, but on a photo, ca. 1910, he wears a 4-medal ribbon bar. The original group probably contained a privately named KSA: he did not have the SA'01 bar, issued May 1909, fitted to the QSA.

Frederick Alexander Campbell was born in Scotland in April 1849 and came to Natal some time before 1870. In 1873 he accompanied Sir Theophilus Shepstone to King Cetshwayo's coronation at Ulundi. Also, in 1873, he served in the Langalibalele Expedition into Basutoland.

Campbell was a foundation member of the Natal Mounted Police, being one of the first two officers appointed when Major Dartnell raised the force in March 1874.

He was promoted Inspector in 1878 and was awarded the SAGS for the Zulu War (1879), the CGHGS for the Basuto War (1880) and the QSA for the Boer War (1899-1902). In mid 1894 a re-organised and enlarged force, the Natal Police, replaced the Natal Mounted Police: at that stage he was one of five Inspectors.

Inspector Campbell retired from the Corps in 1905 and died in Pietermaritzburg on 26 May 1910.

His wife, brother and 10 children, including his son, Sgt H. Campbell of the N.P, survived him.

"...for having on the 1st June 1905, at great personal risk, crossed a flooded river at Bellair, Natal, to the help of B.H. and Mrs Wooldridge, who were in a position of imminent danger, and conveying them to a place of safety."

In 1906, as 2nd Class Sergeant in the Natal Police, he served in the Bambata Rebellion. He resigned from the Police in April 1911 and took up a position as Detective on a West Rand Gold Mine.

He enlisted in the 4th SAI on 10 April 1917, and just over a year later, on 13 April 1918, he was taken **PoW** during the final stages of the **Battle of Messines Ridge**. He was released late in November 1918.

NURSING AWARDS PRESENTED TO:
PROFESSOR CHARLOTTE SEARLE,
THE DOYEN OF THE SOUTH AFRICAN NURSING PROFESSION.**

628. These awards, which include the coveted Red Cross Florence Nightingale award, reflect the honour and esteem with which she was held by the South African and international community. She is rightfully remembered as the pioneer of the South African Nursing profession. **32.000 – 45.000**

Charlotte Searle was born in 1910. She was a founder member of both the S.A. Nursing Council and the S.A. Nursing Association and was responsible for the introduction of the first basic nursing degree in 1955. In 1964 she was the first nurse to be awarded a Doctoral Degree. She was an accomplished author on nursing matters and the recipient of a vast number of awards and tributes throughout her illustrious career. She died, aged 91 years, in 2001.

This unique group, which includes most of the medallic awards she received, includes a professionally prepared CD setting out her most important achievements.
