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PREFACE

Dear Collecting Friend

Welcome to Postal Medal Auction 72. The catalogue for this auction will be available online only. Reluctantly, and with considerable regret, I elected to follow the path taken by leading auction houses. My decision was based on the fact that there is an absence of a regular and reliable Postal Service within South Africa. In addition, there are increased printing costs. Please email me if you remain keen to acquire the hard copy – as this is a new path I am considering the way forward. With this Auction, I urge collectors to browse each section carefully for the medals that they are looking for. Scans can be supplied on request to anyone looking for information. Thank you for your understanding.

Postal Medal Auction 72 includes a good selection of medals and groups and I hope that collectors will find something of interest that could be worthy of a place in their medal collections. As always, the content of any Auction is dependent on consignors and I am thankful for their confidence in City Coins in managing the transfer of their collectables to new custodians. The ubiquitous QSA medal, whether as a single medal or in a group, is contained in this Auction with almost 50 examples. Following last year's much-lauded Boer War Battles Auction, there are no less than 46 examples of the Boer War ABO medals. This includes the fine DTD/ABO pair awarded to Captain De Wet (**LOT 133**). **LOTS 402 to 406** comprise a varied selection of enamelled British Orders.

It is unusual to find a South African group (**Captain Nicholson**) which includes no less than two Decorations as well as two Orders, even if these Orders are civilian awards. Groups awarded to Delville Wood participants always find favour with South African collectors and I anticipate spirited bidding for the fine Military Medal group awarded to **Corporal George Hort**. The Auction closes with a few of the finest civilian gallantry decorations awarded to South Africans during recent years. I was moved by the tragic story of the three young children who went to one another's aid at the Silberstroomstand beach resort in January 1987. (**LOTS 500 to 502**). In addition, there is an extensive selection of miniature medals for the enthusiast.

Evidence has recently come to light in respect of the fraudulent manufacture and naming of ABO medals. It appears that other medals have been compromised. Hopefully the full story will emerge. It is sad that memories of the old soldiers to whom we all owe so much have been held in contempt and that the laudable hobby of medal collecting, which is dear to many of us, has been dishonoured. I take this opportunity to thank Henk Loots for offering City Coins the exceptional privilege to work with an important section of his Boer War collection in Postal Medal Auction 71. In addition I would like to thank Dr David Biggins for his sterling input and contribution towards this catalogue. Louis Jacobus Eksteen's medal was claimed by his widow, her receipt being dated May 1943.
 In her application she noted that he had served in the Frankfort-Vrede Commando serving under Kommandant Roos from 3 October 1899 until he was captured on 14 May 1901.
 He was sent as a PoW to Bermuda.
 Sold with *copy of Vorm "B"*.
23. – Burger H.S. **Becker** VF+ 3.000 – 3.500
Henry Stephanus Becker served in the Ladybrand Commando. He was captured and taken to Bermuda where he was held as a PoW. It would appear that he was wounded at Koedoesberg, 32 km west of Magersfontein, although he did not mention this on his medal application on 28 August 1941.

24. – Burg. S.J. **Bekker** VF+ 3.000 – 3.500
Stephanus Johannes Bekker served under General Cronje and was captured on 17 February 1900. Taking part in the actions listed as: Blauwbank, Mafeking, Magersfontein, Modder Rivier and Paardeberg. Medal issue approved 11 July 1921.
 Sold with *copy of Vorm "B"*.
25. – Burg. J.H. **Steenkamp** VF- 3.000 – 3.500
Jacob Hendrik Steenkamp served with the Pretoria Commando under General Erasmus and was present at Ladysmith, Nooitgedacht, Krugersdorp en "*vele andere*". He served from 29 September until 10 August 1901 when he was captured and sent to India as a PoW.
 The issue of his medal was confirmed on 24 March 1924.
 Medal has several edge nicks.

26. – Burger C. **Van der Merwe** EF- 3.000 – 3.500
 Mr C. van der Merve applied for the issue of his medal in April 1939. Although there are several individuals named Van der Merwe whose first initial is the letter "C" who served with the Potchefstroom Commando recorded on the medal roll there is only one individual whose name is recorded with a single first name. It can therefore be reliably assumed that the recipient of this medal was **Carel Van der Merwe**. He listed service with the Potchefstroom Commando under General B. Liebenberg taking part in the actions at Houwater, Vosburg, Fourteen Streams, Doornkop and Pretoria. He served from November 1899 to 6 June 1900 when captured and sent to Ceylon as Prisoner of War.

27. – Burg. R.E. **Benson** EF- 3.000 – 3.500
Robert Ernest Benson. According to his Vorm "B" he served as a Burgher in the Marico Kommando under General J.C. Cilliers of Potchefstroom "dwaarsdoor de oorlog – 11/10/1899 to 31/ 5/ 1902". His Actions were listed as: Maasfontein (*Magersfontein*), Veertienstroom, Zellekaats Nek (*Silkaats Nek*), Elandsrivier and Kleinfontein. His medal application was approved in April 1922. He presumably served under Vecht-Generaal Johannes Gerhardus Celliers.
 Loosely fitted with original ribbon. Sold with *copy of Vorm "B"*.

Gnr. K.J. Cocker R.A.; 1939-45 Star; Africa Star; Italy Star; DM; WM
Five UK medals unnamed *as issued*; ASM SR. 598845 K.J. Cocker

The SR prefix on the ASM indicates that he was a Rhodesian who at one time or another during the War enlisted and served with the South African forces.

The recipient **Kenneth Joseph Cocker** was captured and held as a Prisoner of War at Benghazi.

He managed to escape on 10 October 1941 having served with C Battery of 4 R.H.A.

His full citation is available and records his dedicated and intelligent information management whilst being held as a prisoner, his pooled knowledge of information shared with him by his companion PoWs motivating and giving purpose to his escape.

MILITARY MEDAL LG 12 February 1942

A “for reference only” document mentions that only 37 MMs were awarded to Rhodesians.

Scratches on the obverse.

All three medals have been skimmed and presumably unofficially re-engraved.

The name T. H. Brokensha is listed on the QSA medal roll for the Dundee Town Guard.

However, Brokensha’s officially issued QSA medal would presumably have been impressed in the usual manner. It would seem that this group is a “made up” and contemporary renamed group of medals, the recipient’s name not being listed on either the medal roll for the Zulu War (or for Moirosi’s Mountain) or the medal roll for the Natal Rebellion medal.

Interestingly neither of the three styles of engraving on the three medals are similar.

Thomas Henry Brokensha. His entry in the **South African Who’s Who** lists him as a J.P. and solicitor and conveyancer stating:

“Volunteered for service in the Zulu War, also in the late Boer War; two medals with bars. During the late Native Rebellion was at Pomeroy, Umsinga, while a detachment of the Natal Royal Rifles under the command of Capt. McKenzie, and a detachment of the Durban Light Infantry under the command of Capt. Henderson, were stationed there.”

Pat Rundgren in his Medal roll and biographical publication **The Colonials at Talana** included innumerable references to Brokensha including additional details of his “military career”.

He clearly played a leading part in establishing hospital and ambulance services during the Anglo Boer War and in other aspects of civilian life in Dundee.

References to him such as in the case of a certain James Burns, Storeman for the Dundee Municipality, for whom he “personally took up his case and he was belatedly awarded a “Talana” bar to his QSA in 1906” suggest that he was keen on “medals”. However, he was seemingly not an enlisted man and regardless of any service which he might have rendered his name was not included on medal rolls other than for a QSA medal awarded for his service during the Anglo Boer War.

One might guess that this QSA medal was “lost” at some time or other. Notwithstanding these remarks, the colonial authorities both at the Cape and Natal sometimes did strange things which still baffle medal collectors but for the purist all three medals are nevertheless renamed.

He attested in the S.S.B. on 5 August 1940 later changing to the T.S.C. Discharged 12 January 1947.

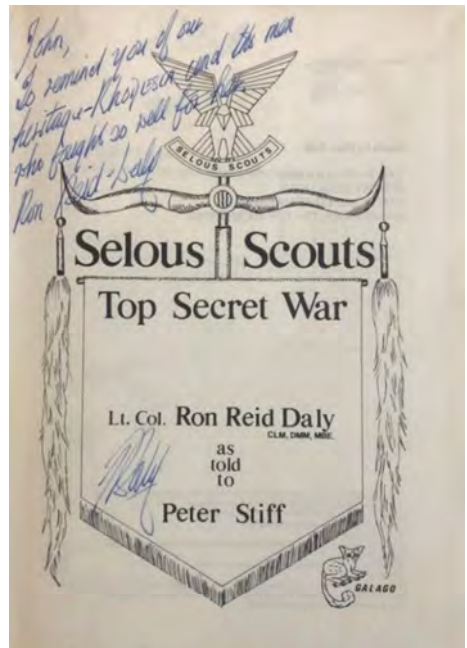

LG 26 June 1902:

“Ian Russell Mackenzie, Captain, Scottish Horse. In recognition of services during the operations in South Africa”.

He was invested by the King 18.12.1902, served in Northern Nigeria in 1906. Source: DSO recipients (VC and DSO Book).

Served with the 12th South African Infantry in GEA, invalided home in 1916, returned to GEA and transferred to the 2nd C.C.

He died of wounds 13.09.1917, wound having been unintentionally self inflicted, was buried at Blantyre Church.

 The citation was worded as follows:
“In charge of camp water supply, who under fire during the battle of Trekkoppies plugged with wood the holes in the water tanks made by shrapnel and rifle bullets as they occurred. The water had to fetched 50 miles across the desert and the loss of it would have been disastrous. His gallant conduct call for special recognition.”
 The WWI Trio recorded as having been issued.

Harry Alphonse Hirsch, the eldest son of August and Kate (nee Gibb) Hirsch, was born in Port Elizabeth on 22 January 1875. Commissioned into the Prince Alfred's Volunteer Guard in 1901 and saw service with the 300 strong Mounted Infantry Section of the regiment.

The Mounted Infantry were split into three companies attached to various columns for scouting and escort duties, and were in action at Vaalkop, Bloemfontein, Kroonstad, Mooifontein, Thabo 'Nchu, as well as Vet River.

In January, Lt Hirsch was mentioned in General Orders for good work against Fouche's Commando. On 1 July 1907 Hirsch was appointed Lieutenant in Regimental Orders (possibly a re-appointment).

In August 1908 promoted to Captain and Adjutant, joined the U.D.F. Permanent Staff in 1912 as District Staff Officer, No.3 Military District. East London.

Promoted Major in 1913 he served in German SWA from 28 August 1914 to 18 July 1915 with the Northern Force on the Staff of General Louis Botha being granted the temporary rank of Lieutenant Colonel on 27 July 1915 and was MiD and admitted to the Distinguished Service Order for this German SWA service in the LG 22 August 1918.

In 1916 he was granted indefinite leave of absence from the U.D.F. to proceed to Europe for service with the Imperial Army.

Sailed on the *Balmoral Castle* on 9 October 1916 and returned from Europe in 1917 and was appointed as D.A.A.G. to No.2 Military District, Port Elizabeth.

On 6 May 1918, he transferred to Defence Headquarters in Pretoria and retired on 6 November 1919. After the end of the Great War, he went to live in France where he died in 1941.

His younger brother John Gauntlet Hirsch was a member of the first Springbok Rugby Team which toured Britain in 1906.

Charles Henry Leonard Boyton was born in Fulham, London on 12 July 1884.

He took part as a cox at the London Rowing Club from 1899 to 1905, the 1901 Census recording his address as No 7, Church Row in Fulham. Coming out to Southern Africa Boyton served in the BSAP 7 March 1908. Stationed at Umtali, Salisbury, Gwelo and Victoria he was discharged having had 5 entries in his defaulter's record as "time expired" on 31 March 1911.

He then became a cattle dealer/farmer in partnership with a Mr. G. H. Shaw at Gwelo. They were both subsequently convicted of contravening the Lottery Act and sentenced to a fine of £10.

Boyton re-attested as a special constable on 17 August 1914 and was discharged on 23 September 1914: "*services no longer required*". During WWI, he served in German South West Africa with the 9th D.M.R. (the Bechuanaland Rifles) from 30 October 1914 to 28 June 1915.

After the conclusion of the campaign Boyton was recommended for a commission and joined the RFA the LG of 14 December 1915 announcing:

"The undermentioned to be Second Lieutenants (on probation). Royal Field Artillery.

Charles Henry Leonard Boyton."

He married Adenine E De Rembert in Portsmouth during the first quarter of 1916 and subsequently served with 76th Army Brigade (3rd Division) in France and Flanders. Boyton was wounded in the head by shrapnel due to German counter battery fire at Langemarck the first day of the 3rd Battle of Ypres, 4 October 1917. It is reasonable to suggest that Boyton's MC was awarded for the action on 4 October as he was evacuated immediately thereafter to England and did not return to active service. LG 7 March 1918 p 2907 MC Gazetted 2nd Lt. Charles Henry Leonard Boyton. R.F.A. Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the battery was heavily shelled and gun-pits and dugouts blown in and men buried, he at once organized a party and started digging them out, continuing his efforts until all were rescued.

Lieutenant Boyton retained his commissioned rank when he resigned in April 1920. He later joined the Royal Irish Constabulary in March 1921.

Posted to H Coy. 7 April 1921. Posted to Q Coy. 28 Aug 1921.

Suspended and dismissed from the force by the Commandant 21 September 1921.

Through the outstanding manner in which he consistently produced work of the highest standard, and his exemplary devotion to duty, air corporal de la Rosa reflected great credit upon himself, the South African Air force and the United States Air Force.”

He was probably the most decorated officer the South African Army and Police have ever had.
During his Army service, Cloete received the Medal for Wedding Service and the Southern Cross decoration, as well as the Military Cross for Bravery, the Italy Star, the Africa Star, the 1939-45 Star, the British Defence Medal, the British War Medal and the African Service Medal.
The Ulchi Decoration of the Republic of Korea and the American Bronze Star Decoration were awarded to him. He also received the United Nations Service Medal and the Korea War Service Medal, the Police Service for Excellence, and the Police Star for Merit.
He was the first man to receive the Police Medal for Combating Terrorism.
Already in the Second World War, "Doompie", as he became known, was a legend.
In 1940 he became chaplain of the Dutch Reformed Church.
He participated in all the important battles with the South African troops in North Africa, Italy, and Southern Europe. During the Korean War, he was always present when South African pilots took off. Many stood for a moment with bowed head at the plane with him while he offered a short prayer before departing on a life-threatening flight. WWII medals are late issues (July 1997) and are pantograph-engraved.* **Bertram Nicholson** CMG, CBE, DSO, MC, fondly known as “**Nicholson of Swaziland**”, was born in Richmond, Natal, in 1875. He was the youngest son of William and Fanny Nicholson who came out to South Africa as Byrne settlers. After matriculating at Maritzburg College in 1893 Bertram joined the Natal Civil Service in January 1894, gaining valuable administrative experience in the Magistrates' Court in Durban from 1896 to 1899.**

Bertram served throughout the Boer War, initially with Murray's Horse and then with the Natal Carbineers from 22 November 1899 to 1 October 1900. He was mentioned in an Addendum to Lord Roberts' Despatch of 2 April 1901 that was belatedly published in the LG of 4 December 1903 (p8019) for "*meritorious services performed*" while serving Trooper with the Natal Carbineers.

On 2 October 1900 he transferred to the Natal Volunteer Composite Regiment and continued to serve with them until 30 December 1900. The following day he re-enlisted in the Imperial Light Horse and served with them as a commissioned officer up to the end of the war, earning a further mention from Kitchener which was noted in London Gazette of 18 July 1902 (p4595) as follows:

"Lieutenant B. Nicholson, Imperial Light Horse: With 3 men captured 18 Boers on 15th April 1902 at Yserspruit, after a long chase".

It is most probably this act which was the reason for the subsequent award of the DSO. (LG 31 October 1902)

After the Boer War, Bertram joined the Swaziland Administration. He was initially appointed as the Assistant Commissioner at Hlatikulu. Further appointments followed as Resident Magistrate, Member of the Special Court, and finally as Resident Commissioner.

Upon the outbreak of World War 1 in 1914, he commanded the Swaziland Troop of the Imperial Light Horse, and served in both the Rebellion and in German South West Africa. He was awarded the Military Cross, as published in the UDF General Order 2691: Rewards for War Services - German South-West African Campaign, dated 24 Dec 1918.

The Recommendation for the award of his Military Cross was listed under "**Headquarters Staff**" as follows: "**Lieut (Temp Captain) Bertram Nicholson, 5th Mounted Rifles (Imperial Light Horse) : In charge of all Intelligence work which he supervised and directed with conspicuous energy and ability and much skill.**"

On his return to Swaziland after demobilisation, he was appointed Deputy Resident Commissioner and Government Secretary and continued to serve as a member of the Special Court with Mr JS Marwick, OBE. He was finally appointed Resident Commissioner of Swaziland, and thereafter retired on pension in 1931. For his outstanding work in Swaziland, he received the CBE in 1924 (Birthday Honours List, LG 3 June 1924) and the CMG in 1932 (Birthday Honours List, LG 3 June 1932). **Both awards (CMG and CBE) were for his services as Deputy Resident Commissioner and Government Secretary in Swaziland.**

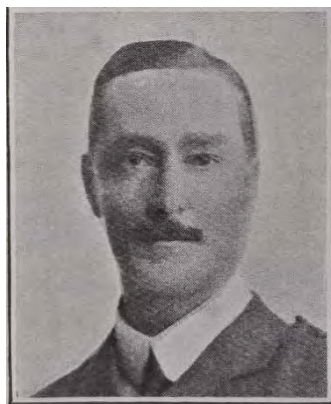
During WWII, he volunteered for service once again was given command of the 4th Battalion Native Military Guards and retired with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in 1942.

He died in Bremersdorp at the age of 69 in 1944.

Quite apart from his meritorious record of service in both peace and war, he found time to be a very fine cricketer, a noted hunter of big game and a most ardent fisherman. He did much in the way of trout and black bass acclimatisation in and beyond Swaziland. He was also very keen on the conservation of the environment and of wildlife.

After his death and at his request, Maritzburg College was presented with a very fine pair of elephant tusks from his own collection and a German Shield, which he took from a railway engine at the battle of Gibeon in South West Africa. The tusks and shield, suitably mounted, serve to this day to remind boys of a distinguished Old Collegian.

Sold with a *substantial file of copied service and other documents. These include medal rolls relating to his Boer War Service, copies of pertinent London Gazette extracts, service details and recommendations for his service period during the Great War and limited WW1 documents. The small photograph is copied from the well-known "The V.C. and D.S.O." by Creagh and Humphris. The copied papers include a relatively poor photostat copy of a seemingly excellent published photograph titled "Magistrate and Staff, Msinga District, 1896" but unfortunately the details of this publication is not noted. This evidently fine photograph shows Magistrate Bertram Nicholson surrounded by his European and Native Staff - the names of the Europeans being recorded.*

403. **Five – Military Cross (Geo. VI)**

reverse dated 1942 and engraved: “**DUPLICATE**”; 1939-45 Star, Africa Star; WM; ASM these last four medals *correctly and officially named 39639 C Mostert*. Cornelis Mostert, a farmer of Twyfelaar, District Carolina, was born on 5 September 1907.

After attesting for service he first reported for duty with the 1st Battalion, Regiment Botha at Voortrekker Hoogte 28 June 1940. He served with his Regiment in Egypt and Libya from October 1941 and was in command of a company of the 2nd Regiment which was attached to the C.T.H. during the historic actions at El Alamein on 26/27 October 1942. His gallantry during the night attack that evening was rewarded by the immediate award of a Military Cross recommended by Lieutenant Colonel Quin of the Cape Town Highlanders.

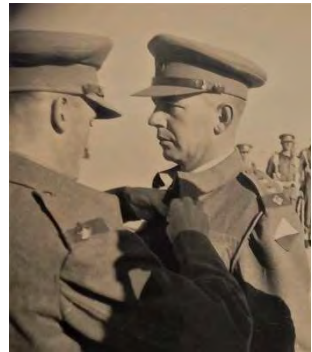
The relevant citation was worded as follows:

“On the night of 26/27 October 42 Capt Mostert was in command of a Coy of 2/Regt Botha attached to 1/CTH for a night attack. His Coy was in the second wave of the attack. The first wave was very badly cut up by enemy machine-gun and mortar fire. In spite of this, Capt Mostert led his Coy into the attack, captured the objective and restored the situation. Although under heavy machine-gun and mortar fire, he personally led his Coy beyond the objective and proceeded to clean up the enemy strong points, kill many enemy and capturing nearly 100 prisoners.”

Capt. Mostert returned to the Union in January 1943 and was released from service in July 1943.

It is to be noted that the Military Cross (clearly an official issue) which was acquired with this group of medal is engraved “**Duplicate**” as shown in the attached photograph however there is no mention in his service records regarding the issue of a duplicate medal.

Sold with *copied service papers, 2 original military training certificates (1941) and a small collection of photographs which record the “in the field” ceremony at which the ribbon of the Military Cross was first pinned on his chest.*

George Alfred Hort was born in Essex, England in 1882. Prior to his enlistment with the 1st S.A.I. Brigade at Potchefstroom on 23 August 1915 he worked as a commercial traveler.

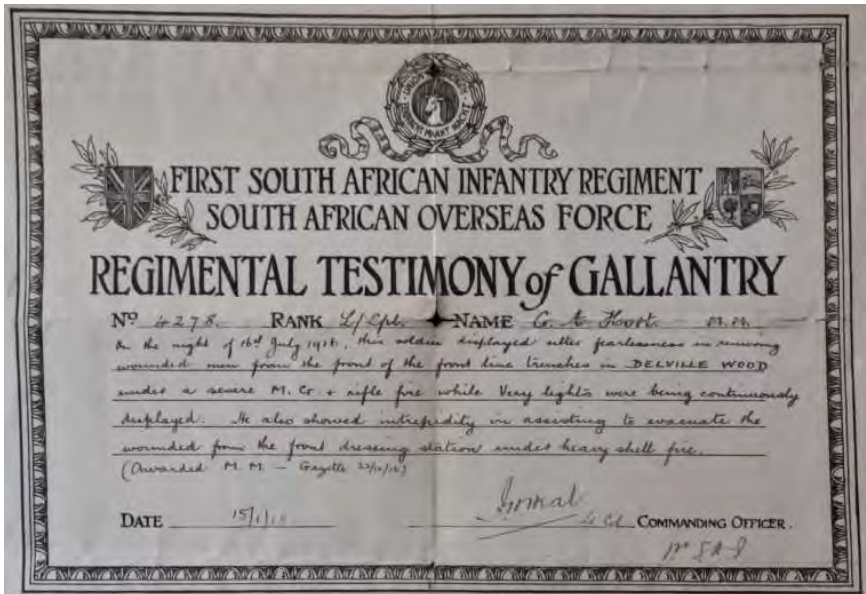
He saw his first action during the Egyptian Campaign in January – April 1916 where the first casualty he recalled, Sgt Watkins of Wynberg, died in his arms during the Senussi Campaign.

Hort later recalled that all he could do was to give Watkins a pill before he succumbed to his wounds.

At Delville Wood Lance Corporal Hort was a stretcher bearer and was awarded the M.M. for bravery under fire. The initial recommendation for 8 men, including Hort, was as follows:

4878 L/Cpl Hort G.A. Lt Col Heal M.M

“Acts of good work and gallantry during operations in Langueval and Delville Wood during 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th respectively.”



A more detailed recommendation was later written by 2nd Lieut. R.M. Lyne in the case of L/Cpl G.A. Hort No. 4878 "D" Coy 1st S.A. Infantry Regiment:

"On the night of 16 July displayed utter fearlessness in removing wounded men from the front of the front line trenches in Deville Wood under severe machine gun and rifle fire, while Verey lights were being continuously displayed. He also showed intrepidity in assisting to evacuate the wounded from the front dressing station under heavy shell fire".

In later years George Hort was very proud of this Regimental Parchment Testemonial Certificate recording his gallantry described above which led to his award of the Military Medal.

This original document is dated 15 January 1918 and although folded, creased and rather worn, is included in the Lot now offered for sale. One of only 25 such testimonial documents of the First South African Infantry Regiment it was specially printed by their Commanding Officer, Lieut. Colonel Heal, in order to show his appreciation to his men and to record their gallant deeds.

Hort continued to serve during the heacy fighting at Arras and Ypres in 1917 and took part in the Brigade's attempt to help stem the German advance in March 1918.

On 23 March 1918 the German forces attacked the Green Line which was the last prepared line of defence held by the South African Forces.

Hort was very proud of his parchment document in terms of which he was awarded the M.M., as it was one of only 85 specially printed by Lieut. Colonel Heal to show his appreciation to his men.

He served at Arras and Ypres in 1917 and took part in the Brigade's attempt to help stem the German advance in March 1918.

On 23 March 1918, the German forces attacked the Green line which was the last prepared line of defence held by South African forces.

Hort later recalled that during this attack he was wounded being shot through the neck as he approached his Colonel, Lieut. Colonel Heal. He was unable to stop the flow of blood and later crawled off before being finally taken in a wheel barrow to the field dressing station.

Fortunately, he was taken to the rear in the last ambulance to leave Manancourt before it was overrun by the German Forces on 23 March 1918. Due to the seriousness of his wounds, he never rejoined his unit and after returning to South Africa he was demobilized on 25 April 1919.

After the war he lived in the Cape Province with his wife Elizabeth. In 1965 he attended the 50th Anniversary Reunion of the 1st South African Infantry Brigade in Johannesburg.

He died the following year.

Holders of the medal qualify for the award of a bar after each subsequent period of 12 years' service.

 23rd Regiment Foot, R.W.F.
Samuel Allan served in Captain Thomas Farmer's No. 7 Company during the Waterloo Campaign, 16-18 June 1815. The Royal Welch Fusiliers Museum records the following:
"It (the 23rd Regiment of Foot) then marched to Braine-le-Leud, arriving on the 17th and passed the night in torrential rain. Wellington placed the bulk of his strength to the right of his line. This was fortunate for the 23rd Regiment as it suffered fewer casualties than those in the centre and on the left. Even so, it lost four officers and eleven men killed, and eight officers and seventy-eight men wounded. Early on the morning of 18th June 1815 the 23rd took up its position, in the second line, to the left of the Nivelles Road. In front of it was a battalion of the Guards. It deployed into line and the men were told to lay down as they were quickly under fire from French artillery on the road. The cannon fire killed Captain Thomas Farmer. The 23rd moved into the front line to replace the Guards battalion, withdrawn to give support at Hougomont. It formed a square and remained in that formation all day, facing many attacks by French cavalry. The Commanding Officer of the 23rd, Colonel Sir Henry Ellis commanded that no man should break rank, even to help a wounded comrade. The Regiment did not falter, even though the artillery fire continued.

The square retired to its former position, then advanced again and the 23rd finished the day by advancing in line finding nothing to oppose it.”

Tragically both his Captain, Captain Walker and his Officer Commanding, Sir Henry Walton Ellis KCB were mortally wounded and died soon afterwards.

Continuing, another reference records:

“After the Battle, the Regiment bivouacked with the rest of the Army at the now-famous La Belle Alliance inn, a few miles south of Brussels. Over the next few days they marched to Mons, then to Valenciennes, then Cateau-Cambresis. On 24 June the regiment participated in the assault and capture of the besieged town of Cambrai. Dunn notably commanded the Ladder Party of the 23rd Fusiliers as they entered the citadel by an old breach near the Port de Paris, “on which occasion his brother officer 2nd Lieutenant Leebody on the same duty was killed.”

From Cambrai the regiment marched towards Paris where they were present for the city’s capitulation on 4 July, pitching camp at the Bois de Boulogne. The following day they marched to Neuilly-sur-Seine.”

Although Samuel Allan quite likely also saw some service during the Peninsular War the name Samuel Allan is NOT RECORDED on the medal roll for the Military General Service medal.

The MGS medal was a retrospectively awarded medal and only those individuals who were alive in 1848 were eligible for the award of this medal.

Trooper **Alfred Michael John Russel Peel** was the son of Sir Archibald Peel and the great nephew of Sir Robert Peel (1788-1850) the former British Prime Minister. A well known Cape Town genealogist unravelled the story of this recipient which he published on his family website as follows:

“Alfred Michael John Russell Peel (Trp. A J Peel) was born the seventh child of Sir Archibald Peel (1828-1910) and Georgiana Adelaide Russell (his second wife) on 16 September 1873, his birth being registered in Blackburn, England and Royton, Denbighshire.

He came of an illustrious line, his grandfather being Major-General Jonathan Peel (1799-1879), Surveyor-General of Ordinance and twice Secretary of State for War and his great uncle Sir Robert Peel (1788-1850), British Prime Minister responsible inter alia for the creation of the Metropolitan Police Force (Metropolitan Police Act 1829).

In the 1881 Census of England and Wales, his home is given as being at “Gerwyn Fawr”, Eyton and Royton, Denbigh, Denbighshire in North Wales. The circumstances whereby he and his brother found themselves in Rhodesia are unclear. To the extent that currently it is known, his participation in the Mashonaland campaign of 1897 is reflected above. Additional to this, he was enrolled as Trooper 62 in the Rhodesia Regiment, a colonial force formed during the Second Anglo-Boer War. He married Kathleen Walsh on the 10 June 1906 in Gwelo, Rhodesia.

He died following a riding accident 20 January 1907. His estate went to probate in the United Kingdom on 23 January 1923. He sired one child, Archibald John Russell Peel (1907-1978).

Despite an extensive search, there is no evidence that he was a registered medical practitioner.”

The 17th (Ayrshire and Lanarkshire) Company was raised in 1900, co-sponsored by Ayrshire Yeomanry Cavalry, and Lanarkshire Yeomanry Cavalry. No. 1460 Lance Corporal **James Hannah** served with the 17th (Ayrshire) Company, 6th Battalion Imperial Yeomanry in South Africa during the Anglo-Boer War from 23 February 1900 to 28 May 1901, and was present during the operations at Wittebergen, 1-29 July 1900. Organisation of the first contingent of Imperial Yeomanry, which arrived in South Africa from February to April 1900.

After disembarking in Cape Town, the troops encamped at Maitland.

The camp was understaffed and had few facilities available to cope with the huge influx. However, on the positive side, many of the companies were retained in the camps for long periods, awaiting transport to the front, and this gave them sufficient time for much needed training and acclimatisation.

The hunt for de Wet continued and, on 5 November 1900, a column of mounted infantry and the 6th Battalion, Imperial Yeomanry, under Lt-Col P W J Le Gallais, entered Bothaville from the north and came under artillery fire from Boer positions south of the Valsch River.

Early on the following morning, the British advanced and attacked a Boer laager at Doornkraal.

Le Gallais was killed, but a small force resisted de Wet's fierce counter-attacks and eventually forced the burghers to abandon their guns and surrender.

During the action, 40 Yeomen took up a position on the flank of the British artillery and came under pressure, to be relieved by the arrival of the mounted infantry. The British losses were thirteen killed (with no Yeomanry deaths) and 31 wounded. The Boers left 25 dead and wounded on the field (Amery, Vol 5, pp15-21; Wilson, *After Pretoria*, Vol 1, pp179-86; Pakenham, 1979, pp474-6).

William Norman Handley Renshaw was born on 2 Aug 1871 at (Ridgeway) Chesterfield Derbyshire.

On 28 August 1891 at the age of 20 **William Handley** attested at Pontefract for Short Service (7 years with the colours and 5 years in the reserve) in the **Yorkshire Light Infantry**; Private No 3495.

He used two of his names on attestation. His trade was Field Labourer.

William Handley served in the **1st Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry** from 28 August 1891 to 25 August 1898 when he was transferred to 1st Class Army Reserve.

Lance Corporal from 11 May 1892 to 9 January 1894 when he was deprived of his stripe for misconduct.

William was recalled to Army Service 13 November 1899.

The **Marriage** of William Norman Handley Renshaw (bachelor, age 28) a Tailor of Worksop, Nottinghamshire took place on 15 November 1899 at Fisherton Anger, County Wiltshire, England.

He joined the Depot on the 20th and was posted to 1st Battalion 22 November then 2nd Battalion on 23 November 1899. 2nd Battalion moved to Sheffield by train.

William was employed in the Tailors Shop. A draft of 170 men left on 1 December, sailed on 24 January, and arrived in Table Bay at 8 am on 19 February 1900. His military history sheet lists South African Service from 23.1.1900 to 24.8.1902.

(His Diary is much more accurate and gives details of his movements.).

24 August 1903 William was discharged to 1st Class Army Reserve, Section B. Norman Renshaw age 87 died in 1958 in the district of Worksop, Nottinghamshire.

Enlisted in SH at PMB on 28 April 1902 – wagon maker, height 5'11", blue eyes, light brown hair, no marks, address PMB. NOK: father, Kokstad, Cape Colony. Discharged time expired at PMB on 21 August 1902, after the cessation of hostilities. He qualified for the QSA medal with clasps Cape Colony, Transvaal, SA 1901 & 1902."

George William Joseph Demmer was issued his QSA medal off the medal roll for Steinaecker's Horse (indicating the single clasp "Transvaal" entitlement). A secondary medal roll signed by Major Edward Lovegrove in Cape Town on 12 April 1905 confirmed his entitlement for the additional 1902 date clasp.

His attestation and service documents for the Great War indicate previous service during the Anglo Boer War and his attestation with the 4th S.A.I. as having taken place at Potchefstroom 5 October 1915.

Arriving in France on 12 July 1916 he missed the horror of Delville Wood but was wounded by machine gun bullets in his lower spine three months later on 12 October 1916 and subsequently spent length periods in hospital at Rouen and London before being repatriated to South Africa in July 1917.

He subsequently spent some months in Maitland Hospital and was admitted to No 3 General Hospital in January 1918. He was finally discharged on 18 April 1920.

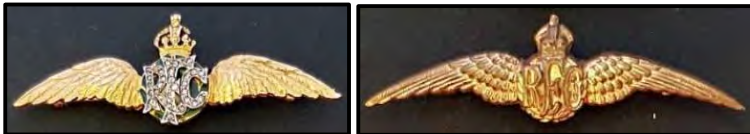

In particular, agreement was reached for the establishment of a joint railway company between the Z.A.R. and the Netherlands which led to the construction of the important railway line from Pretoria to Delagoa Bay thereby providing an alternate transportation route which avoided British territory and control.

A fine specimen of the well-known and important St Helena POW medallion. Several thousand Boer Prisoners of War, including General Piet Cronje, were transported to and held captive on this small isolated island nearly 2000 kms off the west coast of Africa during the Anglo Boer War.

499. – Woltemade Cross for Bravery, silver, **EF 14.000 – 20.000**

unnamed as issued but with the reverse officially engraved as **No "2"**.

This Gallantry Cross (engraved on the **REVERSE** Number "2") was awarded to **Christiaan Jacobus van Rooyen** who risked his life to save a 13 year old boy in the sea near St Lucia in Natal in November 1987.

Chris van Rooyen was the coach of a South Eastern Transvaal school rugby team.

In November 1987 he and two adult couples accompanied their winning team on a celebratory weekend near St Lucia on the Natal coast. On the Saturday morning some of the boys began to play in the shallow water and before long one of the boys, Giel Coetzee, was caught in a rip current. Without any hesitation Chris swam after him, but just as he was reaching close to him the current swept Giel back to the shoreline while Chris was swept out deeper into the sea.

With the aid of a rope Susan Strauss, the wife of a friend of Chris and one of the young school boys, Andre Prinsloo, entered the sea in an endeavour to rescue Chris.

Unfortunately, both Susan and Andre were drowned in their gallant attempt to rescue Chris, but luckily Chris was fortuitously washed back semi-conscious to the shore.

These events drew wide publicity in the South African Press and the following year at a ceremony in Pretoria, the heroism of those involved in this tragedy were remembered when no less than four civil gallantry awards were presented by the State President of South Africa, Mr P.W. Botha.

A singular citation for all four of these awards was worded as follows:

“André Prinsloo and Mrs Susan Strauss lost their lives on 7 September, while Mr Erasmus Hattingh and Mr Christiaan van Rooyen endangered their lives in an attempt to save Giel Coetzee from certain death by drowning. During an excursion on St Lucia Lake, one of the vehicles broke down. While an attempt was being made to repair the vehicle, the boys were playing in the shallow water. A strong cross-current knocked down Giel Coetzee (aged 13) and swept him offshore. André Pretorius (aged 13) swam towards him and helped to keep his head above water. Mr Van Rooyen, who realised that the children were in trouble, ran into the water and swam towards them. He had almost reached them when a strong current pulled them in ever deeper. Mr Van Rooyen also encountered trouble and Mrs Susan Stauss, who was a good swimmer, swam towards him with a rope tied around her waist. Mr Strauss, Mr Hattingh and another person were holding the end of the rope. Mrs Strauss had only a few metres to go when a large wave knocked them down and they lost their hold on the rope. Mrs Strauss was swept off by a strong cross-current and Mr Hattingh who was also knocked down by a wave, succeeded in reaching Giel and André, who was still keeping Giel’s head above water.

The two boys grabbed hold of Mr Hattingh in a panic and almost dragged him under water. He calmed them and advised them to systematically swim with the current to the beach.

A large wave broke over them and Mr Hattingh and Giel were washed out on the beach.

The body of Mrs Strauss was washed ashore shortly afterwards. André’s body was however never found. For their outstanding bravery, the Woltemade Cross for Bravery, Class I: Gold, is awarded posthumously to the late André Prinsloo and the late Mrs Susan Strauss, and for their exceptional bravery, the Woltemade Cross, Class II: Silver, is awarded to Mr Erasmus Albertus Hattingh and Mr Christiaan Jacobus van Rooyen.”

The Woltemade Cross for Bravery in silver was the lesser of two classes of the South African civil decoration for Acts of Bravery. The Cross replaced the earlier Woltemade Decoration in Silver which in turn had replaced the earlier Union of South Africa King’s Medal for Bravery.

The Cross was manufactured by the South African Mint and is officially hallmarked.

The Cross is housed in a large plush bright red case (22,5 x 26,0 x 4,8 mm).

The corresponding miniature medal and lapel badge are missing.

geveem en vir Chris dieper die see in.

Intussen het Susan Strauss, die vrou van ’n vriend van Chris, en André Prinsloo, een van die leerlinge, ’n stuk tou aan hulle vagemak met die doel om vir Chris en Giel te gaan red.

Die seestrom was eger so sterk dat Susan en André nie hulle koppe bo die water kon hou nie en hulle het ongetukkig albei verdink. Chris het oedertussen sy helmsyva verloor en op die strand uitgepoel en daar het die skoubeweging begin afgeleem.

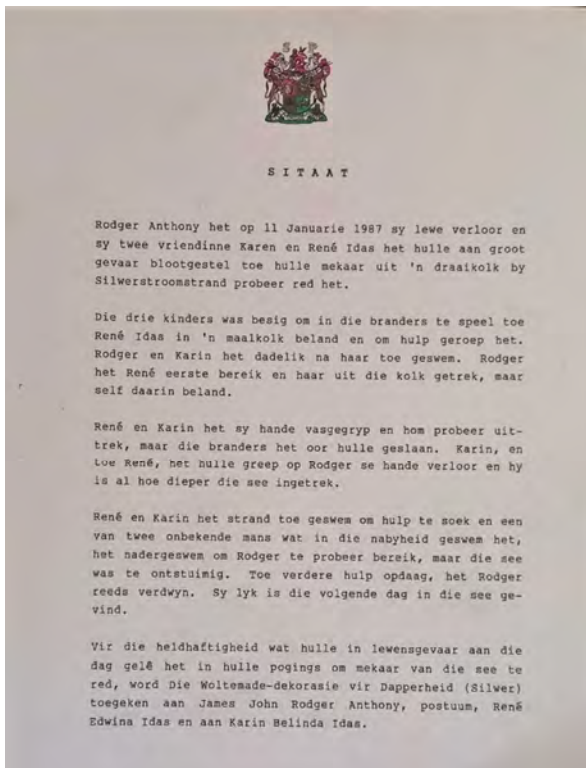

BRAVERY AT SILWERSTOOMSTRAND 11 January 1987

Silwerstroomstrand is a popular bathing beach approximately 40 kms north of central Cape Town.

Situated close to Atlantis, an new Apartheid government inspired industrial and residential development with a focused on this coloured community of Cape Town which was initiated during the mid-1970s, the beach rapidly became a popular, but sometimes dangerous, recreational area.

In more recent years a tidal pool and other beach front facilities have been built but in the early summer of 1987 when a tragedy seemed imminent a group of young beach goers displayed extra ordinary bravery risking their own lives to save the life of another.



TRANSLATION:

“Roger Anthony lost his life on the 11th January 1987, and his two friends, Karin and René Idas, exposed themselves to great risk in their attempt to save one another from a maelstrom at Silwerstroom Beach.

The three children were playing in the breakers when René was caught in a whirlpool and shouted for help. Roger and Karen swam to her assistance at once. Roger reached her first and helped her out of the vortex, but was caught in it himself.

René and Karen grasped his hands and tried to pull him out, but the waves broke over them and first Karen the René lost their grip on Roger's hands and he was swept further out to sea.

René and Karin then swam ashore to seek help and one of two unknown men swimming nearby swam towards Roger in an attempt to reach him but the sea was too rough. When more help arrived, Roger in an attempt to reach him but the sea was too rough. When more help arrived, Roger had disappeared. His body was found in the sea the next day. For the heroic bravery they displayed in seeking to save one another from the sea in extreme danger, The Woltemade Decoration for Bravery (Silver) is awarded to James Roger (posthumously), René Edwina Idas and Karin Belinda Idas.”

At a ceremony in Pretoria on 30 October the South African State President presented the three Woltemade Decorations (silver) relating to the events at Silwerstroomstrand on 11 January 1887.

A well known South African numismatist has poignantly assembled all three of these awards together and City Coins is now privileged to be able to offer all three of these civilian bravery awards for sale. Although the three decorations have been lotted separately and can be bought individually, both the seller and City Coins would be overjoyed if all three awards were able to remain together as a single collection. Today Silwerstroomstrand boasts extensive beach facilities, a fine tidal pool and enjoys premier "Blue Flag" status and life guards over the summer season.

I put in a bid that I knew that I could not lose and eventually got the medal for far less... the feeling of achieving this is unbelievable.”
